"Office Spotlight" Veterans Service

George County is proud to be home to 1,800 U.S. military veterans. These local veterans need assistance in filing claims with the U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs. The County's Veterans Service Officer is Jerry Hite, and he assists military veterans in obtaining their benefits and advising them of their rights. Jerry has been employed by the County since 1986. His newly renovated office is on the first floor of the Courthouse.

Last year the County office handled \$8.6 million in expenditures from Veterans Administration. The most common request include: funeral advice, file claims, widow benefits, children's benefits, discharges, medical assistance, appeals, insurance, government issued homes, loans, and assistance to ex –POW's. We have seen an increase in benefits and assistance due to the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Hurricane Season 2013 Are you Ready?



The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is predicting an above average season for hurricanes this year. With warm ocean waters and a lack of an El Nino; NOAA is predicting 13 to 20 named storms, with seven to 11 of them becoming hurricanes and possibly three to six of those becoming major hurricanes.

The question is: Are you ready for what this hurricane season may bring to our area? Preparedness can be summed up in three steps, be informed, make a plan, and make a kit.

First be informed of all the hazards that can affect our area from a hurricane including strong winds, tornadoes, and flooding. Then make a plan for what you and your family will do should a hurricane threaten our area. Decide if you will evacuate or stay home. If you plan to stay in a public shelter know what to bring with you. If you have pets make plans for them also. Finally make a disaster supply kit. Includes items such as non-perishable food, water, flashlights, extra batteries, battery powered radio, toiletry items, pet food, etc. For more information on preparedness visit www.ready.gov or www.msema.org. Also, the American Red Cross has a free hurricane app you can download for your phone. Remember preparing for a storm now will keep you and your family safe later.



















Quarterly Recipe "Coconut Delight"



1c flour 1 stick margarine (melted) ½ c chopped pecans 1 tsp. coconut flavor Mix until crumbly and press into 9x13 dish. Bake at 350 degrees until lightly browned; let cool. 1 8oz cream cheese 1c confectioners sugar 1c cool whip (from large container)

Mix well and spread onto cooled crust. 2bx vanilla instant pudding 3c milk Large cool whip (minus 1 cup) Mix well and pour over cream cheese layer. Sprinkle 1-2 cups coconut flakes on top and gently pat in.
